














TIP 4: BE VISUAL


Use charts, graphs, and illustrations










TIP 7: TEACH STRATEGIES (NOT JUST CONTENT)

Birth is unpredictable. Teach strategies for navigating vs. memorizing info

- What questions can you ask if you don't remember benefits/ risks? (BRAIN acronym)
- What do you need for yourself if plans change?
- How can you communicate with your partner?
- Metacognition Understanding of your own thought processes





Emphasizes parent's role in the learning process

LEARMING

- What do your students actually want to know/need to know?
- Balance what you know is important for their learning with the things they want to learn
- These topics can be influenced by fears, history, stories from family and friends, etc.

Happy babies have lots of "wiggles" in their heart rate, meaning their heart rate goes up and down. This is called having "good variability." They don't have prolonged dips, called "decels," and they aren't "flat" for long periods of time. Short periods of flatness are ok and usually indicate that baby is in a sleep cycle. They can ometimes be woken by external stimulus (playing with mom's belly, tickling baby's head internally) or the if



What Is GBS

Group B Streptococcus (or GBS) is a bacteria that lives in the intestines, rectum, and sometimes vagina. People can sometimes be "colonized" with GBS without having any symptoms, it's a transient bacteria (which means sometimes you have it, sometimes you don't). Occasionally GBS can cause urinary tract infections (UTIs). Being colonized does not necessarily mean you have an active infection or will develop one.

How do you test for GBS?

A swab around the vaginal and rectal area is sent to a lab and cultured to determine if GBS is present. If you tested negative at 35/37 weeks you have a 91% chance of still being negative at birth and a 9% chance of becoming positive. If you test positive you have an 84% chance of being positive at birth and a 16% chance of becoming negative. (adapted from Evidence Based Birth © - GBS)






